Overview

The Pharisees condemned Jesus for spending time with people they despised as sinners. In response Jesus told three parables describing the lost people that he had come to call; sinners, yes, as are all people, but still valuable to God. Lost people who need not to be condemned for being sinners but to be given a helping hand to be reconciled to their Father.

The sheep didn't realise he was getting himself lost by the way he was behaving; the coin got lost through carelessness, irresponsibility; the son made a deliberate choice to turn his back on his father and go his own way. The shepherd actively looked for the sheep, the woman actively searched for her coin, but the father respected the son's choice only waiting patiently, lovingly, hopefully for him to be ready to be reconciled.

Having been redeemed by Christ on the cross and being able to say that Jesus is Lord and has been raised from the dead, we are now commissioned by Jesus to be his ambassadors, to take his message of reconciliation to other people – to the lost that we ourselves come across. Using the same tactics that he himself used: compassion, forgiveness, generosity and patience, despising none, not looking on people from a worldly point of view.
